"Compassion is not Cowardice"

Scripture, especially in the New Testament abounds with the nature of compassion. Over and over again, Jesus expresses concern with how people need to be treated with kindness and indeed compassion. Yet in society today, many people regard compassion as a sign of weakness, a willingness to subordinate one's self to the needs of others. This is perceived of as cowardice on the part of those who indulge in this perceived virtue. The modern focus is upon being self reliant and capable of caring for oneself. Of course this also can be interpreted as a form of narcissistic egoism. The issue is hardly confined to the present. Many literary figures have devoted attention to the issue.

One writer who has spent effort at considering the nature of compassion is Joseph Conrad. This can be seen in one his perhaps best know works, *Heart of Darkness*. The setting is the late nineteenth century Belgium Congo. It was hardly a compassionate setting. Conrad's main character, Charles Marlow, is commissioned by an exploitative trading company to seek out the whereabouts of its most successful representative, a man named Kurtz. Marlow is to sail down the Congo River into the backwater of this land of ivory. With each mile he travels further away from what was regarded as civilization and humanity. Without dwelling upon all the circumstances, he finds that Kurtz has turned himself into a God, succumbing to the lure of the darkness of the human soul before his death. This, however, is not what this essay is focused upon on. It is concerned with the conclusion of the novel when Marlow has to make a significant decision.

Kurtz, before his descent into evil, was engaged to an innocent young woman who remained behind. Marlow approaches her to offer her his condolences at the news that Kurtz is dead. He does so with trepidation because he is terribly concerned about what to say to her about the degradation of Kurtz's final existence. Indeed, Kurtz himself recognizes at his end the terrible actions in which he has indulged. His final words to Marlow are, "The horror! The horror!" Marlow has to decide what to say to Kurtz's intended when she asks him his final words. After a horrendous introspection, Marlow tells her that Kurtz's final words were her name. Conrad writes, "It seemed to me the house would collapse before I could escape, that the heavens would fall on my head. But nothing happened. The heavens do not fall for such a trifle." Marlow speculates about what might have happened if he had told her the truth. He says, "But I couldn't . I could not tell her. It would have been too dark- to dark altogether..." Conrad, as all good writers do, allowed the reader to decide what to believe

Many, perhaps even including Conrad, believe that Marlow's decision was an act of cowardice on his part. He should have told the girl the truth. What is really reflected in Marlow's decision is a remarkable act of kind compassion. To tell the truth in this instance would have destroyed the person. Compassion is not weakness or cowardice. It is an important component of Christian virtue and the new Social Gospel that needs to be encouraged more, especially in a world that is teetering on the brink of potential moral collapse

Roll total at the end of the meeting was 87. Troy Oliver provided the final 2023 Financial Report prepared by Carolyn McMillan:


Total income for 2023 was \$216,757; total expenses for 2023 were \$252,563; the net amount for 2023 was -\$35,806.
