

The **FPC Mission Statement** describes our life and ministry in the areas of worship, education, mission, fellowship, spiritual development, and stewardship. It describes what we do and why we exist.

"First Presbyterian Church provides opportunities for all God's people to worship joyfully, grow in faith, reach out to community and world, care for church family. And be good stewards of God's gifts."

In the 2023 Officer Development meeting and in the sermon on May 21, I recommended a companion statement of Core Values describing our shared foundations of faith and what we stand for. This list is by no means exhaustive, there is always room for modifications based on corporate and individual evaluation.

FPC Core Values. As followers of Jesus Christ, by the power and presence of the Holy Spirit, with these core values we share the good news of the gospel and show the love of God:

Hospitality

We welcome others as Christ among us and show the love of God with the restorative gifts of courtesy and companionship.

Our Lord Jesus said, "I was a stranger and you welcomed me." (Matthew 25:35)

Community

We are people from various walks of life who gather to worship and glorify God. We rely on one another, and we are capable of being relied upon as we grow together as disciples of Jesus Christ.

"For just as the body is one and has many members, and all the members of the body, though many, are one body, so it is with Christ." (1 Corinthians 12:12)

Joy

We genuinely enjoy being together. We encourage and inspire those around us with a positive and inspiring influence.

"May the joy of hope fill you with all joy and peace in believing, so that by the power of the Holy Spirit you may abound in hope." (Romans 15:13)

Generosity

Jesus teaches us to measure our wealth not by what we have, but by what we are willing to give away. Sharing what we have with others, whether our time, presence, or treasure, is our grateful response to God's abundant grace.

"You will be enriched in every way for your great generosity, which will produce thanksgiving to God." (2 Corinthians 9:11)

Awareness

We take individual responsibility to engage in the life and ministry of our church community and take the initiative to be involved. What does not meet our expectations is understood as an opportunity for us to become more involved in making it better.

We are aware of developing needs and concerns around us and are curious about how God calls us to respond in mission, service, and outreach.

"The purposes in the human mind are like deep water, but the intelligent will draw them out." (Proverbs 20:5) Faithfulness

Our lives are transformed by the scriptures and the living witness of Jesus Christ so that we can live for the glory of God. We grow in faith from our engagement of the Bible and our shared life as witnesses to and agents of God's healing love for the world in Jesus Christ.

"Be transformed by the renewing of the mind, so that you may discern what is the will of God." (Romans 12:2) Service

We follow Jesus by serving others with kindness, humility, and joy. We follow the example of Jesus when we serve others in need irrespective of their background or social standing.

"For the Son of Man came not to be served but to serve and to give his life as a ransom for many." (Mark 10:45)

My encouragement is for us to spend time considering the Core Values one at a time for prayerful consideration of how we can clarify and adapt these for their most useful purpose along our journey of faith. Time with the youngest members of our church family. Welcome Alyssa, a Wittenberg student who is now helping Troy and Julie with Sunday School.








Thank you Linda Hartsock for the planter and plant stand in the entryway. What a nice welcome as we enter our church.


